### **Global Week 2022 Invitation**

We cordially invite members of faculty at both our Erasmus+ partners and partners from outside of Europe to take part in Global Week as a lecturer, a researcher or as both. In 2022 it will be held in the week of 7 -11 March and be both an in person and virtual event.

Global Week will take the form of a series of lectures and seminars on international and intercultural topics, most of which will be located within taught modules. However, in addition we will offer a number of open lectures to all students on topics likely to be of interest to a wider audience. The event is designed to raise a global and intercultural awareness amongst our students and to encourage them to take up an exchange to one of our partners within their degree.

Participants will be asked to offer teaching in person or virtually in the form of a lecture or seminar on subjects of their choice, and with an international, intercultural or their home country perspective. Teaching will take place between 09.00 GMT Monday 7 March and 17.00 GMT Friday 11 March.

Please note: Should your HEI be funding the visit through its Erasmus+ teacher mobility budget, participants will be required to undertake 8 hours of teaching.

In addition, it is planned to hold a Research Forum on Wednesday 9 March affording the opportunity for participants to present their research to both faculty at Hertfordshire and faculty from partners participating in the event.
